## **Our Early Childhood Community**

### What is exciting in your program right now?

Since September the YWCA's Nursery School children have been learning and developing their social/emotional skills. The program/curriculum we use is called The Incredible Years. We started off the year with school rules and general rules of life. This led us into what it means to follow rules and why it is important. Then to understand the following topics, we needed to teach the children about feelings, more than happy/sad and mad/qlad. The children learned what the difference is between anger and frustration, happy and excited, being relaxed and tense. They became very good at recognizing their feelings they were ready to understand what a problem is and how to solve them. We worked on many different scenarios and figured out how to solve them. This is no easy task! Children are coming out of a "me, mine, me" stage and to understand that others have feelings is a big step in development. Following problem solving, children learned that sometime things make us angry and that's OK. It is not about having anger; it's about how to control your anger. This has lead us to our final step in our curriculum and learning how to be a good friend. The children have formed new friendships, gained more self -control, and had a lot of fun learning about who they are. I am confident the nursery school children are ready to embrace the big transition of going to kindergarten and will thrive socially and emotionally. Mindy

#### OFFICE OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES REQUIRED TOPICS

Providers are required by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) to take a minimum of thirty (30) hours of training during every 2 year period. Fifteen hours of such training must be received during the first six months of a new licensure, registration or of new employment by a program. This training must address the following topics:

- 1. Principles of Early Childhood Development
- 2. Nutrition & Health Needs of Infants & Children
- 3. Child Day Care Program Development
- 4. Safety and Security Procedures
- 5. Business Record Maintenance and Management

- 6. Child Abuse & Maltreatment Identification & Prevention
- 7. Statutes & Regulations Pertaining to Child Day Care
- 8. Statutes & Regulations Pertaining to Child Abuse & Maltreatment
- 9. Shaken Baby Syndrome

Staff members from the Council also visited each library to enjoy and participate in the weekly story hours or craft activities.








## Best Wishes to Dixie and Hello to Siobhan
